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#### Introduction from Headteacher Mr Burridge



Dear Parents and Carers,

We have begun 2017 as busy as ever! I am really pleased that we have been able to provide so many wider opportunities for our students; some of which are detailed in this newsletter. We have also maintained our focus on ensuring students meet our high standards and expectations in all areas.

Teaching staff began the year at a Luton Futures conference on Mindsets. We were reminded that success comes from hard work and looked at the research which shows that the brain continues to grow

and make connections. Mindset approaches are already very much built into what we do at Lealands. We believe that it is always possible to improve with effort and that we should praise good effort even if the answers aren't right. It is important for our students to experience challenge and to fail occasionally so that they learn resilience and that the effort and struggle will pay off in the end.

This term, we have a renewed focus on the use of the learning diary. Students are expected to have this on their desk in all lessons and staff are using it to communicate successes and concerns so that parents are kept informed. We are also developing our use of text messages to pass on information to individual parents where this is appropriate. We hope that you will find this useful in supporting your children to be as successful as possible.

Our Year 11 students are under particular pressure this year. Some new GCSEs have been introduced in English and maths which raise the standards and increase the number of examinations, as well as changing the grading structure from A\*-G to 9-1 (5 is the new expected standard set at around an old B/C grade). There is also an expectation that students should gain 8 rather than the previous 5 good GCSEs to meet the new performance measures. Staff and students have been working extremely hard to ensure that they achieve the best results possible and there will be further mocks in March to give students lots of practise before they go into the real exams in June. Good planning and revision now, will support this and so you will see further information on the resources available to students in this edition and more advice and support will be given in the up-coming parents evening.

As I write, I am thinking of our Year 10 students who have just begun their two weeks of work experience. At Lealands, we believe that this is such an important aspect of students'

education. It goes well beyond the actual work they are doing to learning how to interact with adults in unfamiliar settings, gaining confidence, understanding some of the demands of working life and so on. I hope that they are finding the experience interesting and not too daunting!

This month, we received our numbers for September and it is clear that the school will be full again with our final year of growth bringing us up to the full capacity of 1050 students. This year has been a challenge with significantly more students and our newly introduced Year 7 lunchtime to accommodate this. We had to bring in significantly more staff in September at a time of teacher shortages nationally which continues to be a challenge. However, we are confident that, with careful planning, we will be able to accommodate this final year of increasing numbers.

Over the coming months we are all looking forward to some exciting performances in the Dance Show and the Easter Concert which I hope that many of you will be able to support. With best wishes,

#### GUIDELINES FOR VISITS TO THE MEDICAL ROOM

- Our trained Medical Officer can administer minor first aid and will contact parents/ medical services for more serious cases.
- All accidents and visits to the medical room are recorded and monitored.
- All visits should be made during break/lunch time, unless it is an emergency.
- Any student attending the medical room during lesson time <u>without</u> their learning diary being signed by a teacher will be sent back to class.
- If a student is causing a real concern or is in distress, a visit to the medical room is at the teacher's discretion.
- It is very important to ensure that we do not dehydrate. Students should ensure they bring a bottle of water with them to school – this can be refilled at the water fountains. Students will not be permitted to leave lessons to visit the medical room to get a drink.
- Any fizzy drinks or energy drinks WILL BE CONFISCATED.
- Students should not be leaving lesson to use the toilet unless it is an emergency or they have been issued with a toilet pass due to a medical issue. Please speak to Matron if you have any concerns.

#### MEDICINES IN SCHOOL

Prescription medicines **MUST** be supplied to the Medical Room in a container labelled by the pharmacist.

All other medicines must be provided in their *original* packaging.

All medicines held and dispensed by the Medical Room must have a parent's/carer's written consent.

Medication prescribed for 1/2/3 doses a day should **not** normally require administration during the school day, unless times are specifically stated by their GP. The medication should generally be taken at the following times:-

1) before school 2) on arrival home from school 3) before bedtime

#### Asthma Inhalers

Inhalers for the relief of asthma must be immediately available and should be carried in school by pupils who use them. Please ensure the child's name is on the inhaler. A spare inhaler should be left in the Medical Room in case of emergency.

#### <u>Paracetamol</u>

Paracetamol can only be given to students who have returned their permission slip. Tablets will only be given at break, lunch time and at change of lesson unless the school has been informed the student suffers with migraine or is on the Medical List.

Students must not carry pain relief tablets. If students are caught carrying medication in school, the tablets will be confiscated and the Senior Leadership Team will be informed.

#### 48 HOUR RULE

Could I please remind you that any child who has had diarrhoea and / or vomiting should be kept at home for 48 hours from the LAST episode of diarrhoea or vomiting.

This directive comes from the Health Protection Agency – Guidance of Infection Control in Schools and other Child Care Settings.

#### MEDICAL APPOINTMENTS

Whilst we realise that some of these are unavoidable, please try and book appointments before or after school and ensure proof is supplied to ensure a two hour appointment time is authorised. Students should not be taking the whole day off school to attend appointments.

For longer appointments (ie London hospitals), please speak to Matron direct as a longer absence can be authorised in exceptional circumstances.

In the months of December and January we distributed over 150 micro:bits to our keen Year 7 and Year 8 students to explore independently, referring back to the micro:bit website: http://microbit.org.

Micro:bits are "a pocket-sized codeable computer with motion

detection, a built-in compass and Bluetooth technology" unveiled by the BBC in 2015 and given free to every child in Year 7 or equivalent across the UK.

# Wadham College, Oxford University Trip



Towards the end of last term, 15 year 10 pupils were lucky enough to visit Wadham College which is one of the 38 colleges that make up the University of Oxford. During the morning pupils were introduced to what life might be like for them at University. They found out about the different degree courses that were on offer, how students were taught, and what the best universities were looking for when it came to qualifications and applications.

The group attended two taster sessions. One of the taster sessions was about Medicine, how bacteria spreads and evolves, and how best to tackle problems associated with this. The second was an

introduction to philosophy exploring the merits of hypothetical ways of producing a new human being by copying parts of an existing one. There was also a tour of the campus to see the facilities on offer and talk about university life with some Student Ambassadors who are currently studying there.

In the afternoon pupils visited the Natural History Museum of Oxford University. They took part in a hands-on session which explored how researchers and students studied animals by looking at bones to examine the inside, preserved specimens to study the outside and live specimens to
