

LUMEN PARTNERSHIP CONFERENCE

On the evening of Tuesday 19th March we held our first conference for teaching staff in the Lumen Partnership.

Teachers and other staff from Lealands, Leagrave Primary School, Waulud Primary School and The Meads Primary School all came to Lealands where we talked about the development of the Partnership, our aspirations and were inspired by our leading expert keynote speaker, Richard Gerver. It was a great



opportunity to get the whole partnership of schools together to think about how we embrace change, within our shared values, for the positive benefit of our teaching and pupils.





As you know, there was a lot of planning and preparation for Literacy Week this year and we would like to share with you all that Lealands High school students and staff were up to during the week.

To create excitement and build up prior to the week, we hosted the Scholastic Book Fair in the LRC where students were able to browse and purchase books/stationary. They were able to use their £1 book token that was given to all students.

We held a competition that ran before Literacy Week, to see which tutor group could accumulate the most Accelerated Reader points since coming back from the winter break. It was very tense with weekly updates,



but I am happy to report 76SF were the winners of Year 7, and 82JW were the winners of Year 8! 76SF were especially surprised, as they were the tutor group with the least amount of Accelerated Reader points for a while, but managed to not only catch up, but be at the top of the leaderboard. This is a great example of it's never too late to try, even if you are in last place! Both winning tutor groups were awarded with sweets to share as a class and the glory of knowing they were the number 1 tutor group for reading, so well done to them.





We also asked Year 7s and 8s to get into teams of 4 to see which team could collect the most Accelerated Reader points as a collective. It was very tight between two teams, The I Don't Knows and Lealands F.C, but the I Don't Knows just beat them to it and were crowned the winners! They were both extremely competitive, egging each other on. The winning team was awarded with an afternoon treat of watching a film of their choice and eating popcorn as a well done for their dedication to reading.





On Tuesday, 10 poetry books were hidden around the school,



and each book had a prize assigned to them. If a student found the poetry book, they were asked to take it to the LRC to claim their prize. Prizes varied from sweets to a voucher for the book fair. Students were also able to keep the poetry book as a bonus prize. We hope the successful students enjoyed their prizes.

Here is an example of a student's work where Nitya Bhatt filled in the missing lines of *If* by Rudyard Kipling. I'm sure you can agree Nitya grasped the theme of the poem well and made it just as powerful.






CELEBRATING PI DAY: A MATHEMATICAL FEAST

Every year on March 14th, maths enthusiasts and scholars around the world celebrate Pi Day. This quirky holiday pays tribute to the mathematical constant π (pi), representing the ratio of a circle's circumference to its diameter. Pi Day is not only an occasion to indulge in delicious pie treats but also a time to appreciate the beauty and significance of mathematics



opportunity to inspire and empower young girls.





Girls designing logos for their product



sculpture, installation, textiles, photography and film. Their task was to investigate links between the artwork and their chosen GCSE exam theme, such as '*fragments*'.


