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Introduction from Headteacher Mr Burridge



Dear Parents/Carers,

The Summer term is well under way and our Year 11 students are fully into GCSE exam mode. We are very proud of their efforts and some practical examinations have already taken place. It is a stressful time, but staff are working hard to keep them calm, focused and revising hard with lots of additional classes for them after school, at weekends and in the holidays.

This term, I have introduced 'Hot Chocolate Friday'. This is an opportunity for me to meet with some of our students who are nominated weekly by staff for going above and beyond our expectations. It has been an absolute joy to spend time talking to these wonderful young people who give so much to our school. As you will see in this edition of the newsletter, rewards and celebration continue to develop as we wish to emphasise the positive and make sure we are recognising the very best of our students.

During the course of this year, we have been looking at the next five years for our school development, consulting with students, staff and governors. We will also be taking parents views into consideration and with this in mind, I will be re-establishing our Parent Forum. We used to have a small, but dedicated group of parents that formed a reference group and gave helpful feedback on our improvement journey. I hope that many of you will volunteer to join the new group when it is established. More information will be published soon. Later in the term, we will be having a special event – 'Expedition Day' as the culmination of all our work on this to launch the next five year plan for our school.

We have already started preparing for September. I am pleased to say that the school remains a very popular choice locally and Year 7 will be full again. The number of first choice applications has increased dramatically and for almost all of our new pupils, Lealands was their first choice. With this in mind, we are working hard to recruit and replace teachers who are moving on. This has been challenging in some subject areas; particularly science and maths, and we have had more turbulence in a couple of classes than any of us would desire. If your child has been affected, please be assured that we are doing everything within our powers to ensure that the high standard of teaching we enjoy across the school continues.

As you know, we pride ourselves on having high standards and enjoy the support of the majority of parents with this. I am pleased that our re-emphasis on the basics of uniform, punctuality and attendance are ensuring that almost all students consistently meet expectations. Thank you for your ongoing support with this which helps to ensure that

rules are applied fairly and consistently to all. Students have been reminded that earphones, like mobile phones, are not allowed to be seen in school and will be confiscated. I would also encourage all parents to talk to their children about safe and sensible use of social media. We do a lot of work on this in school, but also find that many issues between students stem from inappropriate use of social media outside of school.

We are looking forward to a number of exciting events later in the term. We really hope that our full sports day can go ahead this year and are very much hoping for good weather. An Experience Day is planned for the last week of term and I hope that you will encourage your child to take part in something new and exciting from the many choices that will be on offer. Although theme parks will be an option, these have not proved very successful in the past as students are usually disappointed by how long the queues are with so many schools visiting at this time of year.

Thank you for your continued support for the school and I look forward to seeing many of you in the near future.

Please can we remind parents and carers that the school is unable to provide change to students for the catering cash terminals.

Wherever possible, please can you ensure you provide your child with the correct change before they come to school. Ideally all payments should be made online and we discourage strongly students from bringing cash into school.

School Ties

School ties can be purchased for £6.00 using our online payments system. Once paid for, they will be available for your child to collect from the school's Finance Office.

Parents' Parking



We have recently received some concerns from local residents regarding parking around the school. There can be a lot of congestion at the start and end of the school day, causing safety issues to pedestrians, residents and other drivers.

We understand that it can be difficult to find safe parking near the school, especially at peak times, but please remember to park and drive considerately and with due regard for the safety of others.

Your support on this matter is much appreciated.

School Reception Opening Hours

The school reception is open between the hours of 8am and 4pm Monday to Friday. We have an answerphone service that will be checked each morning. If you are waiting to collect a student after school please ensure these arrangements are set in advance as they will need to wait outside of the school gate for collection.

To ensure students' safety, we politely ask that parents do not park in the visitors parking area unless previously agreed due to safety/mobility reasons.

Students are not allowed to wait in the school reception before or after school hours due to the variety of visitors that may be in the area at any time. Again, please ensure collection times are arranged in advance for outside of the school's main gates.

Summer Medical Update

Coping With Hayfever

- Please ensure your child takes their medication **before** they come to school (e.g. antihistamines, eye drops, nasal sprays, etc).
- Spare medication may be left in the Medical Room for emergencies. All medicines held and dispensed by the medical room **must** be provided in their **original** packaging and must have a parent/carer's written consent.
- Please ensure that your child has ample supplies of tissues. A little pot of Vaseline is also useful – your child can dab a little under his/her nose to provide a lubricating barrier to the constant irritation from blowing and rubbing.



Keep Hydrated

It is very important to ensure that we do not dehydrate. As well as keeping our bodies fit and healthy it will also help keep concentration levels higher and therefore improve performance at school.

Can you please ensure that your son/daughter brings a bottle of water with them to school – this can be re-filled at the water fountain. Any fizzy drinks or energy drinks **WILL BE CONFISCATED**.



Cups **will not** be available from the medical room and pupils will not be permitted to leave lessons to visit the medical room to get a drink.

Asthma Inhalers

Inhalers for the relief of asthma must be immediately available and pupils with asthma are encouraged to carry their inhaler with them at all times. It is also very important that the school is provided with a spare inhaler in case the pupil's own inhaler runs out, is lost or forgotten. All inhalers must be labelled with the child's name and should be left in the medical room in case of emergency.

It was a fantastic and thought provoking morning and we would like to thank Sophie for all her help and ideas.



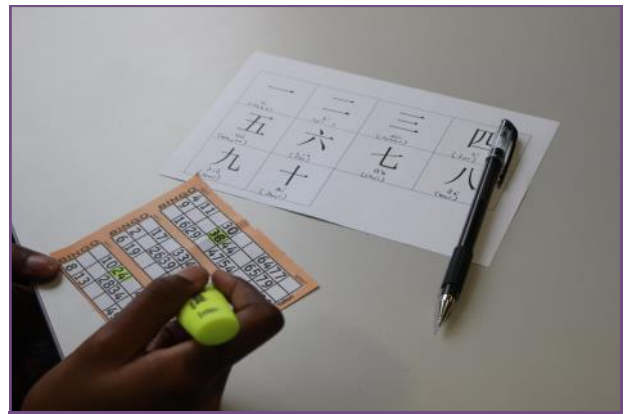
Lealands' Languages day

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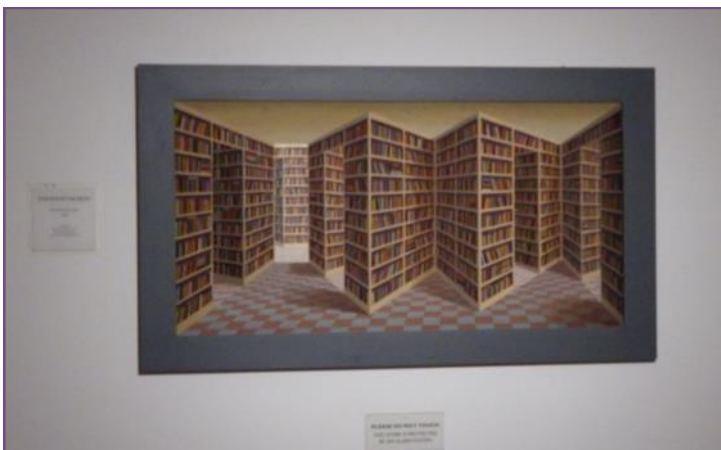
Literacy Leaders - British Library Trip

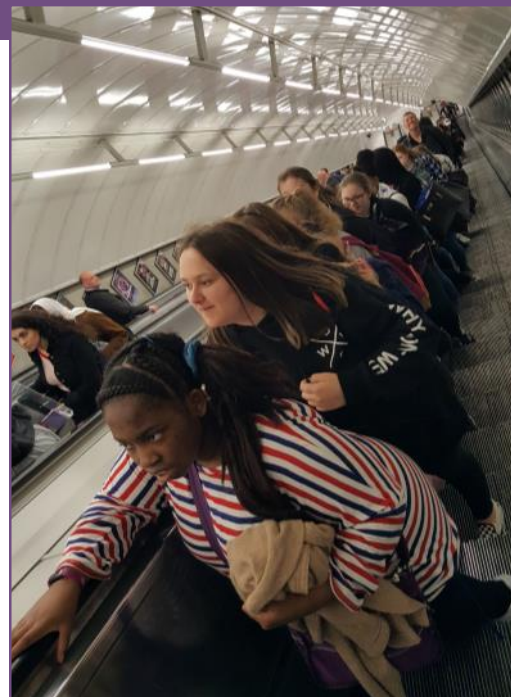
School of Rock Trip

Year 9 Blue Peris Trip

The damage was severe enough to force the centre's closure and threaten our annual trip to the beautiful Welsh mountains. Luckily we were able to secure alternative accommodation at the Kent Mountain Centre and thus our trip was able to take place.

Nineteen students and four intrepid staff set off on a cold and damp Sunday morning in search of adventure and that is exactly what we found! After a very uneventful journey we were welcomed by our instructors who whisked us all off for a "nice gentle" walk to the top of an old slate mine. This is the traditional method of testing everyone's walking boots. Trust me, if you're climbing a mountain your boots better fit properly!

The students were split into 2 groups for their daily activities and day 1 saw them raft building at Lake Padarn and abseiling at Blast Shelter (this was renamed Barry by Group 2 and one student even stopped halfway down for a rest on Jasmine's ledge). Everyone had fun but for a few, the abseil was just too scary!

Day 2 saw the two groups on different adventures, gorge walking and mining. The gorge was spectacularly beautiful and very, very wet! Wetsuits on and there was no stopping us. The mine is one of the scariest of activities where students get clipped on to a line 30 metres above the floor and then they must edge out and traverse an almost vertical wall...in total darkness! Day 4 had Group 1 going sea level traversing (SLT) and Group 2 climbing Yr Aran. The SLT takes place on Anglesey and the weather was not going to help, with cold winds and rough seas. The highlight for Group 1 was Miss Hambleton doing the full Bear Grylls on the Tyrolean traverse.

Day 5 was another reverse day but unfortunately for Group 1 the weather was not kind to them again. Yr Aran was in the clouds all day which meant all the climbers were wet and missed out on the most amazing views. To make matters worse Group 2 had glorious
