INTRODUCTION FROM HEADTEACHER, MR BURRIDGE



Dear Parent/Carer,

After the cold dark days of January it is great to be heading into Spring and all that this brings with the promise of renewal. On that theme, we continue to work with all our students on their attitudes and values, recognising that they can choose how they act and what they achieve through the correct attitude. To support this, Miss Duge produced a fantastic video presentation that all our students watched with their tutors about manners and politeness. We have introduced a new STEP point for this called MAPS and it has been wonderful to see so many of our students embracing this to make our community a better place with thousands of MAPs already awarded. This timely introduction fits well with February's value of the month which is 'kindness'.

Our final push towards GCSEs is well underway with extensive revision and intervention classes offered to students and some practical exams already taken; our students studying Hospitality and Catering produced some amazing dishes for this, beautifully presented. It was fantastic to see the culmination of all their learning and preparation, working so calmly and carefully under the time and exam pressure.

Earlier this term, parents were invited to a presentation about our relationship, health and sex education. It was great to see a number of parents attend and engage with this. Mr White has produced a fantastic Loom of the presentation for anyone who could not attend or who is interested in what we teach and how we teach it. This is available on the school website. We know that this aspect of education is a very sensitive one and one which requires parents to engage in sometimes difficult conversations with their teenagers. We are always able to help with advice and information so please do get in touch if you would like this.

I am really excited by the many additional opportunities that we are building into The Lealands Journey (this outlines all the trips, experiences and visits we provide to students across their 5 years with us and is available to view on the school website). We are constantly looking to enhance what we can provide and the range of opportunities is phenomenal. We try to ensure that some of these are low or no cost to support our families, but also want to provide the widest range and so we will be having another trip to

Morocco (it's a long time since the last one!) and a very exciting ski trip is being planned to Italy for 2025. We have started planning our end of term experience day trips with the aim that every student attends an off-site experience that day. Many of the popular standard trips will be on offer again and many new experiences so there is something to appeal to everyone. Please make sure

We continue our school journey of excellence, having picked up our next award, the Silver Arts Mark. The arts are a powerful learning experience and are extensive at Lealands. I am hugely grateful to all our staff, but particularly to Mrs Reason, Director of Art, for driving this over a number of years. Our Artist in Residence does amazing work with students and the wider arts curriculum is second to none.

We have been pleased to host some face-to-face parents evenings alongside our online parents evenings this year. We recognise that there are pros and cons for both approaches and so currently have a mix of these across the 5 years. This is constantly under review to ensure that staff and parents can meet and work together in the best way possible to support their child's learning. Please don't hesitate to let us know your thoughts on this if you have any.

You may be aware that there is a national drive on school attendance. Although, our attendance continues to be significantly above the national average, like all schools this has declined following the Pandemic for various reasons. We have also seen an increase in lateness to school and, in some cases, lessons. We are determined to ensure that our students get the best education possible and the first step in this is to be present. Extensive research demonstrates the negative impact of missing school time; even just a small amount, on progress and all outcomes for young people. We are seeking your support to ensure that your child/children arrive to school on time every day and is present whenever possible. As you know, we sanction lateness with detentions daily, but these should not be necessary and certainly should never occur more than once. If there is a specific and unavoidable reason for your child arriving late, please phone to let us know. On the other hand, we will continue to reward our students for great attendance and punctuality so they know how much this is valued for them.

Finally, I am so looking forward to the upcoming performance of 'Grease'. Our performers have been rehearsing tirelessly for months and it should prove to be another amazing show. I hope to see many of you there.


STUDENT LEAVE OF ABSENCE POLICY

together. They won 5 games and lost just 2 which meant they came 3rd place overall. A fantastic achievement in their first year at Lealands as a team!

LEALANDS' RECORD BREAKING STUDENTS

CLASS OF 2023

We are absolutely thrilled that our already record-breaking Progress8 score for the class of 2022/23 was upgraded on 1st February 2024 to -0.01. This means that more students than ever from our school achieved or exceeded the grades than they would have achieved at other schools. Lealands is continuing to move ever upwards, which was recognised when the school was judged "Good" by Ofsted last year. In addition, Lealands places in the top 30% compared to schools nationally with a similar cohort for progress.

A positive Progress8 score has been our ambition since the measure was introduced in 2016 and this is a huge step towards that. We are thrilled with our students' outcomes and our fantastic staff who supported the students to achieve these results. It has been a pleasure to see so many of them returning to school to collect their brilliant result certificates.

SOME OF OUR HIGHEST FLIERS

- Genevieve achieved 7 grade 9s and 2 grade 8s
- Reina, our Head Girl, achieved 6 grade 9s and 3 grade 8s
- Tommy achieved 6 grade 9s, a Level 2 Distinction* (8.5) in Child Development, 1 grade 8 and 1 grade 7
- Taskin achieved 5 grade 9s, 3 grade 8s and 1 grade 7
- Abbie achieved average an average grade of 8.38
- Ushaaney achieved average an average grade of 8.28

In addition, it has been great to hear successes from students who left longer ago: university offers, apprenticeships and the starts of exciting careers.

We are confident that our current students will emulate this success and reach or even surpass the year group's before them. Our current Year 11 students are preparing for their mock exams after the half-term break; and then in May/June they will sit their GCSEs.

In December, we took our Year 7 literacy students to Whipsnade Zoo to take part in a climate change workshop. They learned about climate change, how it affects us and how we can contribute to global warming. They also analysed temperature and animal data to establish the of climate effects on endangered animals. Then there was some free time to explore the zoo and students were lucky enough to see some of the animals up close in their enclosures.

In December, our Year 8 literacy students took part in a history workshop run by Wardown Museum. In the session they learned about the expansion of Luton, life in a workhouse and the straw hat making process. 






ATTENDANCE

We all know that good attendance at school is so important in helping students achieve good GCSE grades. The more time a student has off school, the harder they will find their GCSE exams.



The images shown here, indicate how low attendance has a direct negative impact on achievement.



What parents/carers must do:

- Try to telephone the school before 8.30am each day of your child's absence.
- Tell the school in advance of any medical appointments and bring in appointment cards/letters.
- If you are not sure whether your child is well enough to attend school, send them in anyway as they often perk up on arrival.
- Have a backup plan for if your child misses transport, call on a family member, neighbour or friend.
- If you and your child are experiencing difficulties with school attendance then talk to us as a first step so we can help!


What WE will do:
