#### **Year 7 Boys Football**

The Year 7 Football team started their season away vs Alameda School from Ampthill in the National Cup. This was going to be a tough one as Alameda have been together as a team from year 5 being in the 3 tier education system. Lealands started nervously with it being their first game together and were 1-0 down within 5 minutes from some miscommunication. Lealands grew into the game and equalised just before half time to make it 1-1 leaving the second half all to play for. The boys started the second half brightly and played some lovely football resulting in going ahead 2-1 and then taking the lead even further by scoring a third and putting the game out of reach at 3-1. Alameda managed to get one back late on but the boys defended well to see the game out and advance to the next round.



Round 2 saw Lealands play Simon Ball School from Bishop Stortford in our first game at home for the season. Lealands started the game really strongly and went 1-0 up in the first 10 minutes with a 30 yard strike lobbing the goalkeeper. Simon Ball pulled one back 5 minutes later from some good play and just before half time, scored to make it 2-1 through some more great footballing play. In the second half Lealands played well and created some excellent chances and it just was looking like it was not our day, hitting the post and

having two cleared off the line. Simon Ball extended their lead to 3-1 against the run of play. Moments later, an instant reply, with Lealands scoring a fantastic 30 yard strike into the top corner. Unfortunately, we ran out of time and we exited the national cup 3-2.

A great start to the season with plenty more to come in the county cup and district cup.

The U16 boys basketball team started the season with a strong 47 - 36 win over Challney High School for Boys. An impressive early offensive display by Malachy and Logan, supported by strong team defensive work, enabled Lealands to sore into an early lead that was maintained throughout the game. 
Attendance continues to improve here at Lealands, which is fantastic and shows the dedication that our school community has to being the best they can be! Last academic year our overall percentage attendance was 1.7% greater than the National Average. We were also asked to be part of a case study for the DfE to try to support other schools to improve their attendance. This shows how hard we are all working in partnership to ensure students are in school as much as possible.

As a reminder, if your child feels unwell and you are unsure if they should be attending school, there is a helpful tool which the NHS has put together to support you in making decisions about their illness <a href="https://www.nhs.uk/live-well/is-my-child-too-ill-for-school/">https://www.nhs.uk/live-well/is-my-child-too-ill-for-school/</a>. We also know that students can also feel anxious about school for a number of reasons and request that if you are concerned about this, that you contact your child's HOY/PSM or myself. # 'Blue Ties' Start Their Lealands Journey

The Transition journey for our 'Blue Ties' started in June for most of our students. Myself and Mr Hall visited many local primary schools introducing ourselves to our new year 7's and delivering assemblies about life at Lealands, helping to ease the transition for future students. Our Transition Evening provided an invaluable opportunity for parents and students to meet key staff, including their tutors, and to ask questions about the upcoming school year. Furthermore, during Transition Day, students experienced a taste of what a typical day at Lealands is like, making the leap into secondary education feel a bit more familiar and exciting as they prepared for September.

During the summer, Mr. Payne led an engaging Summer School programme that provided students with a fantastic opportunity to explore a variety of subjects, including PE, geography, science, and art. The diverse range of activities not only enriched their learning experience but also allowed them to connect with their peers and build friendships before the school year began. Additionally, the program enabled students to meet their teachers in a relaxed setting, helping to ease any anxieties about starting a new school year.

On September 3rd, the 'Blue Ties' stepped into Lealands High School for the very first time, experiencing a whirlwind of emotions. They kicked off their day with an assembly led by myself, where we explored our core Lealands values: respect, responsibility, and excellence. I shared the exciting opportunities available to them, including a variety of extracurricular clubs, educational trips, and leadership roles that will enrich their school experience. Following the assembly, students spent time in their tutor groups, engaging in icebreaker games that helped foster connections with their peers and tutors. A significant moment of the day came when they received their Chromebooks, after which they eagerly set up their emails and Google Classroom accounts. Chromebooks are seen as vital tools and key components to enhance students' learning throughout their journey at Lealands.

Six weeks in and Year 7 are fully flying. Our 'Blue Ties' have launched into life at school with such confidence and energy. They've jumped into extracurricular clubs, stepped up as student captains, found their voice through student council, and many have earned roles in our Mary Poppins production. Staff across departments have been stopping myself and Miss Mushtaq (PSM) to share how impressed they are. Year 7 have been focused in lessons, resilient when things are challenging, and genuinely enthusiastic around the school. They're holding doors, trying new things, and setting the tone for what it means to be a 'Blue Tie'. The STEP's are on fire too! Together, Year 7 have clocked over 30,000 STEPS already for hard work, kindness, excellent manners, extended learning, correct equipment and many more, which is such a statement this early on.

25% - Bronze Badge - 5 extra STEPs


50% - Silver Badge - 10 extra STEPs

### Accelerated Reader for our Year 7s

At Lealands, we place great importance on literacy and encourage all students to carry a reading book as part of their daily equipment. Our Learning Resource Centre is open after school and during selected breaks, where students can borrow up to three books for three weeks. Please remind your child to return books on time and in good condition.

All Year 7 and 8 students take part in weekly **Accelerated Reader lessons**. They are also asked to read for **one hour at home each week** and record this in their reading log, which should be signed by a parent or carer. Reading progress is tracked each lesson and progress is shared via their reading logs so please check this every week.

Students may bring a suitable reading book from home if it's part of the Accelerated Reader programme. The website <a href="www.arbookfind.co.uk">www.arbookfind.co.uk</a> allows you to check this. For book suggestions, visit the Learning Resource Centre section of our school website or contact Ms Rezaei.

### **Reading at Home**

We know that reading is one of the most powerful ways to boost learning, confidence and wellbeing. Research continues to show that regular reading - both in and out of school - has lasting benefits for young people. From research, here are some key findings and a few practical ways you can help encourage reading at home.

### **Why Reading Matters**

- Reading for pleasure is strongly linked to better literacy, vocabulary, comprehension and general academic achievement.
- A recent UK study shows that daily reading in childhood is associated with fewer emotional and attention problems later, as well as improved social behaviour.
- Enjoyment, personal choice in reading and reading as a socially connecting activity are key to sustained reading motivation.

### Tips for parents: Supporting your teen's reading habit

- Let them choose: offer a variety of books and encourage autonomy in picking what interests them.
- **Share reading:** talk about what they're reading, swap book ideas and show your own reading habits.
- **Build routine, not pressure:** set aside low-stress reading times (e.g. 15 minutes each evening) rather than linking it to extended learning.
- Create a "reading space": make a comfy, quiet corner with access to books and minimal distractions.
- **Recognise effort:** praise progress, celebrate finishing a book and speak positively about reading as rewarding in itself.
- **Use reading as connection:** discuss characters, themes, or ask what stood out this strengthens comprehension and engagement.










# MP Sarah Owen Joins Year 9 Digital Citizenship Workshop
