Introduction from Headteacher Mr Burridge



At Lealands, we continue to climb the mountain to success. Our Year 11 students are now fully immersed in their preparations for GCSE examinations and have already achieved success in some practical assessments. Many are attending and benefitting from the Summit Support Centre which opened this year to give our students a well resourced and supportive study space before and after school.

As you know, we have been working hard to further improve the learning attitudes and behaviours of our students this year, ensuring that they all CLIMB (Contribute, Listen, Ignore distractions, Maximise effort and Build on successes, while

learning from failure). We are really pleased with the results of all our work in this area. Although we are not at the summit yet, all of the data and information we have tells us that transformational improvements have taken place. In the Summer of last year, we introduced some very clear consequences for poor behaviour (the behaviour ladder and defiance ladder) and these have worked to radically improve the attitudes of a small minority of pupils whose behaviour was falling well below our expectations. In addition to the punishments, we have also increased our support for students so that they learn how to better manage their own behaviours. We now have a fully staffed alternative curriculum addressing the needs of students who struggle to meet appropriate standards of behaviour.

I am pleased that after many years of negotiations, this alternative provision will soon move into the former Elearning Centre at the entrance to our school. It will be great to see this building operational again and fulfilling a well needed purpose for our students as well as a few who we will take from other schools on a temporary basis.

After Easter, we will be further enhancing our strong culture of reward and celebration with the introduction of Epraise – this online system used by a number of schools will, I am sure, bring even more opportunities to praise and reward students who work hard and do the right things. Staff have had some training in this system and are excited about the benefits it will bring. Eventually, this system will replace a number of other online applications such as ShowMyHomework and bring them together in one place. I have continued to enjoy Hot Chocolate Fridays with our students who go even further and are nominated for a hot chocolate and cake with myself, because they exceeded expectations and went 'above and beyond'. I am looking forward to rewarding about 50 students with an Easter Egg at the end of term for their record of 100% attendance, perfect behaviour and homework record.

During this academic year, we are working on developing the 'Lealands Journey'. This will include the entitlements and opportunities we want all students to have during their time with us. We strongly believe in developing well rounded young people who gain a wide range of experiences

through their education. It is great to see the number of opportunities that we are able to provide. We even have a group of students who will be trekking in Morocco, in June, over some real mountains! We have increased the range of trips and visits this year as well as the number of organisations and groups coming into school to support our students. In the first term of 2018-19, over a third of the school population had attended at least one trip. We want to work to get this to 100%. Additionally, we will be ensuring that all our students see a live performance and visit a museum, for example.


As we move into the Summer term we are thinking about the coming academic year. I am pleased to report that the school continues to be very popular and we currently have a waiting list of over 40 students to join us in September, having filled all places in the first round of applications. Although this is good for the school and financial stability, we recognise that some parents will have been disappointed not to have been allocated their first choice place at Lealands. We are working with the Local Authority to see what can be done to help them with this.

I hope that you have a restful and peaceful Easter and that our Year 11 students enjoy some relaxation along with their revision and study for GCSE examinations.

The school prefers for all school meals to be paid for online. This gives you the flexibility to top up your child's account at home using a debit or credit card rather than having to use cash or cheque.


Further details and an online payments instruction manual can be found on our website under the 'Parents' Information' section.

Please can we remind parents and carers that the school is unable to provide change to students for the catering cash terminals.

Wherever possible, please can you ensure you provide your child with the correct change before they come to school. Ideally all payments should be made online and we discourage strongly students from bringing cash into school.



Learning Diaries

If your child loses their Learning Diary, they will need to purchase a new one from the school's Finance Office at a cost of £2.50.





Water Bottles

We have now removed all plastic cups from the drinking stations around the school. In order for students to stay hydrated throughout the day, they must ensure they have a refillable bottle to use whilst in school. Reusable bottles are available to purchase online or from the school Finance Office at the cost of £1.30.

School Ties

School ties can be purchased for £6.00 using our online payments system. Once paid for, they will be available for your child to collect from the school's Finance Office.

School Reception

The school reception is open between the hours of 8am and 4pm Monday to Friday.

If you need to contact the school outside of these hours, or the reception line is busy when you call, we do have an answerphone service. Alternatively, you can email your query to **admin@lealands.luton.sch.uk**, or message us through our Parent App. These are checked regularly during school hours and your message will be passed to the relevant member of staff/department and dealt with as soon as possible.

Collecting Students

If you are waiting to collect a student after school please ensure these arrangements are set in advance as they will need to wait outside of the school gate for collection.

To ensure students' safety, we politely ask that parents do not park in the visitors' parking area unless previously agreed due to safety/mobility reasons.

Students are not allowed to wait in the school reception before or after school hours due to the variety of visitors that may be in the area at any time. Again, please ensure collection times are arranged in advance for outside of the school's main gates.

There can be a lot of congestion at the start and end of the school day, causing safety issues to pedestrians, residents and other drivers.

We understand that it can be difficult to find safe parking near the school, especially at peak times, but please endeavour to park and drive considerately and with due regard for the safety of others. Your support on this matter is much appreciated.


We send you text messages directly to the MyEd app relating to important information about your child's education and to remind you of events that are taking place at school.

The students explored exhibits from all areas of STEM and had the opportunity to watch some fascinating shows. There were so many areas to explore that nobody got to see everything but a great time was had by all.

The Royal Air Force had their newest fighter jet on display, Glaxo had interactive competitions and there were even venomous snakes and scorpions.

Next year promises to be even better and we can't wait to take our next group of students.

STEM – Escape Room Challenge

On Friday 1st March, our Year 7 and 8 students were set a STEM based challenge to use their communication skills, problem solving, logical reasoning and teamwork skills to complete an escape room challenge delivered by our Science Department and Wiseminds Escape Rooms.

The students had to solve a variety of puzzles and clues which enabled them to find keys and combinations to open locks and briefcases. They were set a time limit of 45 minutes to complete the escape room, so were also working under pressure.

The students demonstrated imagination and creativity to decipher the clues, culminating in all groups successfully completing their 'escapes' within the given time.


The day involved students going to different seminars run by different universities around the country, as well as Russell Group universities. The students were also involved in a market place activity, meeting staff and students from the universities.


Our students and staff had a really good day, finding out about higher education in the UK as well as apprenticeships. We even managed a trip to Nandos, Macdonalds and KFC!


through the tree house to poison Peter, (played by Makai, also in Year 7).



Update From The Governors

Mrs A Herbert, Parent Governor

Lealands High School

I first became a parent governor at a local infant school where my three sons were pupils. I was already involved with the PTA and when a vacancy came up I decided it would be a great opportunity to support the school and local community, as well as find out more about the challenges faced by schools and how they operate. I remained a governor there for over 6 years. Several years later, soon after my youngest child joined Lealands High School, a vacancy came up for a parent governor and I was appointed in 2017.



Fulfilling the role as parent governor:

As a school governor I have a privileged and responsible role and attend governing body meetings regularly. I play an active role in committees and decision-making - I support the governing body decisions even if I disagree because I will have had the opportunity to contribute to those decisions.

The role and responsibilities of parent governors are no different from those of other governors. Parent governors are not delegates and do not speak 'on behalf' of the parent body, but bring a parental perspective to the issues discussed.

Benefits of being a parent governor:

Being a parent governor has given me a better understanding of school policies and how these are implemented, I also understand the difficulties and challenges faced by schools in general and more specifically at Lealands High School. I have the opportunity to make a difference, not only for my own children, but for other parents and children in years to come.

Although the role of a parent governor can be challenging and time consuming when also juggling family and work commitments, I have no doubt that the benefits far outweigh any challenges. I have learnt a lot and developed new skills through training and support – this experience has definitely also helped me develop my career and I now work in a school myself.

Year 11 GCSE Art visit to the Tate Modern



In February, the Art Department took Year 11 GCSE students to the Tate Modern Gallery in London. They spent the day viewing and collecting visual research for their final GCSE exam which takes place in early May.

Students had chosen their starting point from the exam paper and viewed artwork that connected to their selected theme such as 'Messages' or 'Spaces'.

They have used the information collected to produce an evidence page of their visit and to start to develop their theme linked to the artists they have chosen. This will gain them extra marks in their GCSE exam folder.

The Tate is housed in the former Bankside Power station next to the Thames and is one of the largest museums of modern art in the world. Students were amazed by the size and scale of the building. We visited the viewing platform to see landmarks right across London.

In February, our Year 10 students took part in a two week work experience programme. This gave our students the opportunity to spend two weeks with a local business or school, learning and acquiring news skills, as well as experiencing work life first hand in their chosen field.

Our students worked in a number of organisations from well-known retail outlets to local nurseries, garages and restaurants.

It was a great success and I would like to congratulate all our students for their hard work and commitment in completing their two week work experience.

Here are some of the accounts taken from students about their experiences:

For my work experience I arranged to work with my Mum at Bizzie Bees Nursery for two weeks from 8.30am to 3.00pm.

I worked with a variety of children from all different backgrounds and ethnic groups and I was responsible for 2 to 3 year olds and some younger children.

My duties included supervising the children at all times making sure they were safe and happy. I took part in a variety of activities such as reading stories, acting out the bear hunt story and playing in the messy area, as well as supporting the nursery assistants.

I helped prepare and serve snacks and helped the children wash their hands and tidy up.

I thoroughly enjoyed working at my Mum's nursery and it has helped me to consider my future plans on a career working with young children.

For my work experience I worked at a local garage located on Leagrave Road, Bury Park.

I wanted to work with cars, engines and general mechanics so this was the perfect placement.

Mr Quddus organised my hours and I worked from 9am till 4pm. During the two weeks I was busy throughout, learning lots about cars and how to fix them.



I also helped service cars by doing the petrol emissions tests for MOT's.

The team at SMC Motors were really friendly and helpful and they gave me advice on how to pursue a career in mechanics.

My responsibilities varied each day and during the two weeks I helped set the tables, take




orders from customers and help prepare ingredients for the chefs to cook. I also made their most popular hot drink, the café latte for the customers.


Overall, it was a great experience and I learnt a lot about myself.

Languages Trip To Cambridge University

On the 16th of January, a group of ten Year 8 students visited Cambridge University with Miss Cole and Mr Marie. They were invited to discover and discuss the reasons why studying a language at GCSE is so valued in our British community.
