#### NO CHANGE GIVEN!

Please can we remind parents and carers that the school is unable to provide change to students for the catering cash terminals.

#### School Reception

The school reception is open between the hours of 8am and 4pm Monday to Friday.

If you need to contact the school outside of these hours, or the reception line is busy when you call, we do have an answerphone service. Alternatively, you can email your query to admin@lealands.luton.sch.uk, or message us through our Parent App. These are checked regularly during school hours and your message will be passed to the relevant member of staff/department and dealt with as soon as possible.

#### **Collecting Students**

If you are waiting to collect a student after school please ensure these arrangements are set in advance as they will need to wait outside of the school gate for collection.

To ensure students' safety, we politely ask that parents do not park in the visitors' parking area unless previously agreed due to safety/mobility reasons.

Students are not allowed to wait in the school reception before or after school hours due to the variety of visitors that may be in the area at any time. Again, please ensure collection times are arranged in advance for outside of the school's main gates.

There can be a lot of congestion at the start and end of the school day, causing safety issues to pedestrians, residents and other drivers.

We understand that it can be difficult to find safe parking near the school, especially at peak times, but please endeavour to park and drive considerately and with due regard for the safety of others. Your support on this matter is much appreciated.


The team voted for the player of the tournament, which was ME! But I could not have done it without the help of my team mates.

### Attendance - Medical Appointments

There has been a continuing increase in the number of students missing part of the school day due to medical appointments.

Whilst we realise that some of these are unavoidable, please try to book appointments outside school hours or during school holidays. If this is not possible, it is expected that students are only out of school for the actual appointment and are therefore able to attend before and/or after in order to allow minimum disruption to their lessons and attendance. Students should not be taking the whole day off school to attend appointments.

Where appointments are necessary in school hours, please ensure your child's absence is reported at least 48 hours before to Student Services together with the appropriate documents, e.g. an appointment card/letter to ensure the absence is authorised.

In the event of emergency appointments, can you please contact the school and report your child's absence and ensure supporting documentation is handed in when your child arrives late to school.

For longer appointments (ie London hospitals), please speak to Matron direct as a longer absence can be authorised in exceptional circumstances.

Parents/carers should be aware that if the school does not receive any official confirmation of a medical appointment during school time, their child will be given an unauthorised absence that will affect their attendance record. If attendance drops significantly as a result, cases will be referred to the Educational Welfare Officer for investigation.

#### STEM Trips - Bletchley Park

On Wednesday 3rd October, myself and a handful of other students had the opportunity to go to Bletchley Park. Bletchley Park was bought by M.I.6 just before World War II, as they thought it might come in useful. It did.

During the Second World War, Bletchley Park mansion and its surrounding areas were used by a team of code breakers working against the clock to decipher German coded messages. These code breakers played a large part in the ending of World War II and historians believe

that the war might have gone on for at least another year had the code breakers been unsuccessful.

Whilst we were at Bletchley Park, we were able to go into the huts where the code breakers worked, attend a coding workshop and have a guided tour. During the coding workshop we were able to use an enigma machine (the machine the Germans used to encrypt their messages) and use different methods to crack codes.

The tour was my personal favourite part of the day because the guide was local and had met some of the people he referenced during the tour. I also enjoyed how informative the guide was.

#### STEM Trips - RAF Museum, Hendon

On Friday 5th October, a group of eight Year 10 students, including myself, went to the RAF Museum, Hendon to take part in the 2018 MBDA's Aircraft Reconnaissance Challenge, as part of the STEM programme. The task was to build and design a glider that could fly over map set out and collect points. There were various tasks for the day, including; to gather intel given to us to establish the map, a presentation and the building of the glider.

Upon arrival, we were introduced to the task and the day ahead. Then we were given multiple lectures about information that would be useful to create our aircraft. We were taught the basics of aerodynamics and given advice on what materials should be used to make the glider. Afterwards, we had a tour of the museum which included many interactive activities,





such as a game of snake. Then, it was time to build. We were given a budget to buy materials and resources for the shop to make our designs. We also had to present our design, as well as a design of a World War 1 and 2 reconnaissance, to a panel of judges. At the same time, the information about the map was being released.

After collecting the intelligence, we were tasked with plotting where different points were on the map, with allied resources collecting positive points and enemy's losing points. We then had to plot our flight plan to collect the most points available to us. After designing and building our aircrafts, we were to throw them across the flight plan we had planned. Afterwards, we were given another throw as we knew where everything was on the map. Neither of the Lealands teams won overall, however, the boys group won the best mission planning. It was an enjoyable experience for all which concluded with medals.

#### STEM Trips - London Transport Museum

On Thursday 8th November, a group of Year 9 students and I went on a STEM trip to the Transport Museum Depot in Acton. We first were asked to fill out a questionnaire about what career path we wanted to go down in the future and what subjects we were interested in that are related to STEM. We were then set a challenge to make a bridge on a magnetic board that had to transport a train with an 'egg' inside. It was a bouncy egg! You had to make it stop before it hit the buffer by using Velcro. Tennyson's team won and my team came 4th. We did have a train with dodgy wheels! Callum then gave us a tour of the

museum where we had to uncover past problems and find transport solutions that have kept London moving from A to B. We then had the great opportunity to interview 2 engineers about their working lives. Everything that we had completed was for our CREST award which would be given to us by a third party.

The main thing that I took away from the experience was that there is a need for more women in the engineering world and that anyone can do anything if they put their mind to it.



next to the Lealands memorial tree. A representative from each tutor group stepped forward and planted poppies and crosses alongside the wreath. Students were given access to the

#### Lealands Remembers

On Tuesday 6th November, as part of Lealands' remembrance commemorations, 73JO led a brilliant assembly to the rest of their year group; explaining the reasons why we commemorate Remembrance Day and why the poppy has become the symbol of remembrance.



#### World War I Workshop

Our Year 7s gained a fascinating insight into life as a World War I soldier during a workshop set in 1914.

The workshop follows the journey of real life soldier, Arthur Seaby and his peers, as they signed up to fight for their country in WWI.

Firstly, they faced the doctor who put them through their examinations to make sure they were fit for service. Having passed, they were signed up for three weeks basic training which included learning discipline and weapons training.

At the end of basic training, the new recruits were sent to the trenches where they learned about trench foot, mustard gas, whizz bombs, no man's land and writing letters home to loved ones. They were also introduced to the stark reality of the huge numbers of soldiers who went to the trenches but didn't make it home.

It was a fantastic experience for the Year 7s enabling them to imagine what life must have been like for those soldiers who fought in the war.

Our Year 7 students have been demonstrating their generosity by collecting donations for their Christmas appeal, 'Operation Christmas Child' shoebox appeal. #### Blue Peris Trip, November 2018



On Sunday 18th November, 20 intrepid Year 9s and 5 members of staff jumped on a coach and headed for North Wales. Blue Peris was our destination, an outdoor activity centre specialising in adventure activities in and around the area of Snowdonia. After a six-hour journey, we arrived with anticipation. We were swiftly shown our dorm rooms and given a welcome briefing. Then reality hit. We were handed our equipment for the week –

walking boots, wellies, water proof trousers and jacket, the thickest fleece I have ever seen in my life and a balaclava! We all felt that we were in for a very busy week.

We were not wrong. The students were split into two groups to take part in activities. All week, we were awoken at 7am by Mr Payne's iPod playing music very, very loudly. The first song every day was Bob Marley's "Get up, stand up". All the students hated it at first, but I think they secretly began to like it by the end of the week. After breakfast, we were told what equipment we needed for they day and we had to meet by the mini-buses by 9.30am.

Group one started by going down into an old flint mine called Rhiwbach. Without our head torches, it would have been pitch black. Whilst there, the students climbed a waterfall, abseiled into a cavern, navigated the maze of corridors as a team and exited by climbing a 50ft

vertical ladder to fresh air. Each and every student showed excellent resilience towards the activity and I was very proud of them.

Group two began their adventure on the first day by visiting a gorge and climbing up to the top of a hill......by walking up a river. At points, chest deep in ice cold water and then clambering up jagged waterfalls, everyone was thankful for that thick fleece, which sucked the water away from their skin. Despite being freezing cold, every single student showed immense determination to get to the top and jump from high into a plunge pool.

The first day was hard work but extremely rewarding. Even after all their excitement, the students still had to unpack and tidy their equipment, complete their duties for dinner and partake in a team building activity (both wet and dry!!). A nice moment of each day was meeting at about 9pm for a hot chocolate and chat about the day. Then off to bed to prepare for the next day.

Day two saw the groups swap activities. Again, each and every student pushed themselves to their limit to succeed.

As previously mentioned, each day a small group had to do a duty. These were set up for breakfast, clear away and wash up breakfast, set up for dinner and then clear away and wash up dinner. When this first started, the students needed a little guidance in how to complete these. However, throughout the week, the experience led to some great team work, leadership and a promise from many of them to do more chores at home. I wonder if that has come to fruition?

Day three, and both groups headed for the coast of Anglesey to do some Sea Level Traversing. This was essentially rock climbing sideways whilst dangling from a rope above crashing waves and jagged rocks. Every single student became a hero in my eyes, because it scared me silly, but each one of them got on, helped each other find the best place to catch a finger or wellie hold and became each other's cheerleaders. I was ever so proud of the students for the way that they approached this task and conquered their fears.

Two other tasks that we completed whilst we were there was a zip wire across the rocks and a Tyrolean – a rope stretched across a craggy inlet that we had to crawl across commando style, one foot hooked over the rope and the other dangling below for balance. This was so much fun and who would have thought we would have so many commando candidates!

The next day was the big one. Each group were given a mountain to climb. If any exercise was going to test the targets of the week of responsibility, respect, excellence and resilience, it was this one.

Group 1 headed up Elidir Fawr, aiming for the 943m above sea level summit. It was hard

going from the very first step. Steep climbs caned their legs, fierce winds whipped their faces and snow froze their feet, but still they went on. Similarly, Group 2 made their way up Y Gar under the same conditions. With the wind, snow and gravity against them, they made it to their summit as well in great cheer. Across both mountains, the students pushed each other, helped each other and cheered each other on. The camaraderie that had been growing throughout the week was on grand show here. Nothing will beat the feeling that hit us all as we reached the summit through our own sweat.

Every day, my admiration for a group of twenty Year 9s grew. From simple 13 and 14 year olds from Lealands High School to super heroes every single day.

The final day of adventure saw the groups partake in the same activities, but at separate times. They visited a local lake called Llyn Padarn for a raft building challenge. Instantly, they worked as a team to plan their raft and build it together. It was to everyone's glee that both groups successfully created a raft that floated and stayed together. Some students happily jumped in the lake to celebrate remaining dry!

The second activity was a climb up and abseil down Union Rock. This was a cliff of about 10 metres. Students had to climb a rope that was controlled by other students – they were responsible for each other's safety. Then they could abseil down again, this time controlling their own rope and at their own speed. Once again, fears were conquered and actions excelled at.

Upon returning home after a week of intense adventure, I was sitting at home watching I'm a Celebrity, and all I kept thinking was things like...I know a student who would do that better, I know a student that would be down that cliff first...I know a student who would be a better leader. I think I mentioned all twenty names to my wife, who is starting to get very bored with my stories of Blue Peris. However, she does think that we have some very brave young people here at Lealands.

That whole week, I witnessed excellence, I witnessed respect and I witnessed responsibility. I witnessed awesomeness. I am extremely grateful to all the students for their excellent attitude, fantastic sense of humour and terrific determination. They grew as individuals, learnt something about themselves and had the time of their lives.
