Dear Parent/Carer,



## SEVERE WEATHER PROCEDURE

In the event that the school has to close, we will always endeavour to give as much notice as possible. The school will follow these procedures to notify parents/carers:

- Text Message\* parents/carers who have not downloaded our MyED Parent App, will receive a text message. \*Please ensure you inform us if any of your contact details change so we always have the most up to date information for you. Failure to do so may result in messages not being received.
- Social Media Updates keep an eye on our Facebook, Instagram and Twitter pages for updates.



Then it was time to clean the house and minibuses, hand in all the equipment and say a fond farewell to Blue Peris.





# BOOK REVIEW – THE WILD ROBOT PROTECTS BY PETER BROWN. REVIEWED BY ALEX URZICA, YEAR 8

The book, The Wild Robot Protects, has many intriguing chapters and a wide variety of characters and things that happen. In this book Roz, the main character, finds out that the island she lives on has been infested with poisonous ocean tide which kills everything in its path. Dead fish appear on the coast, greenery and plants die, animals have nothing to eat, and most importantly the sea animals are stranded on land. They try to improvise by using holes to capture rainwater, but this doesn't work out because of the arguing and fighting over who is and who is not allowed in or to drink from it.

The next night a storm reaches the island and lightning strikes a tree causing a great fire, which then diminished from the rain after a couple of hours Roz the robot is now fed up, and sets off on a journey to try stop the poison tide by exploring the oceans to find the ancient shark who is said to live far in the north. On her way she encounters a variety of animals with the saddest being an octopus mother who will have to sacrifice her life for her babies to live. She passes through villages, underwater civilisations, a sunken town and even through the far and cold north. When Roz finds the shark, she finds out that it starts from a mining station in the middle of the ocean called the juggernaut. Roz's plan is to try to negotiate with them but the sharks plan is to gather an army of animals and strike. They then decide to stick with Roz's plan but if it fails they will proceed with the sharks. So Roz sets off to the station and when she arrives she gets imprisoned by the robot guards. When the station manager arrives to see what the problem is, Roz negotiates and says that they are making a big mistake due to the fact that their mining process is infecting the ocean. The manager then said if it is as she says she will stop, but because Roz was taking too long, the animals thought her plan failed which led to them striking.

Whales, sharks, fish, birds, octopus, squid and even plankton team up to stop the tides for once and all. They then sink the station whilst Ros saves the people on board and brings them to safety. The thing I didn't tell you is that the juggernaut itself isn't doing the mining, but a massive underwater robot crab. The animals then lift the juggernaut and crash it in the robot whilst Roz

## STANDING UP AGAINST BULLYING



In November, our Year 7 and 8 students actively engaged in an impactful anti-bullying assembly. The aim of the assembly was to effectively show the detrimental effects of bullying and the harmful consequences of spreading rumours.

Some of our students shared their insights following the assembly:

In our anti-bullying assembly, I remember learning about the effects of spreading rumours. For example, if someone said they like

someone's hair but someone misheard it, they could have told someone else and it could have kept going. In the end it would be that they said that they hated them or something that could affect the person's self esteem as they didn't like them, but it started with a person just giving them a compliment. Every year children are at risk when they are tempted to play on the ice formed on open waters and adults find themselves at risk as they attempt to save them. Over 50 % of ice related drowning involved an attempted rescue of another person or a dog.

Areas with frozen waters can be beautiful to look at but they are also extremely dangerous. Here are some useful tips to help you enjoy these areas safely.

#### **TOP TIPS TO STAY SAFE**

#### **HEVER GO ON THE ICE UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES**

This includes attempting to rescue another person or animal who may have fallen through the ice.

Try to take walks in the daylight but if you must walk in the evening, only use well lit areas and avoid anywhere with water.

#### KEEP AWAY FROM THE EDGE OF THE WATER

Never go close to the edge or lean over to touch the ice You may overbalance or trip and fall in.

# LWAYS WALK WITH AN ADULT OR A GROUP OF FRIENDS

Look out for each other and it someone does fall through the ice there will be others around to raise the alarmand get help

#### WHAT TO DO IF YOU FALL THROUGH THE ICE

Keep calm and shout help'

Spread your arms across the surface of the ice in front

Try to kick your legs and pull yourself out of the water and on to the ice

Lie 11st, spreading your weight is the surface and pull to the bank, you may and it easier to roll

you cannot climb out, wait for to and weep as still as possible sep your head above the water. ns by your side and keep your legs togethe

Once you are safe, it is important that you go to hospital Imme for a check up

#### WHAT TO DO IF YOU SEE SOMEONE FALL THROUGH THE ICE

Shout for 'HELP' and dial 999 or 112 if you can

DO NOT walk on to the ice to attempt a rescue

Shout to the person to "HEEP STILL" and offer reassurance.

If they are close enough, LIE DOWN TO AVOID OVERBALANCING and falling onto the ice, and try to reach them with a tree branch clothing tied together or anything else which can extend your reach.

If you cannot reach them, SLIDE SOMETHING which floats across the ice, such as a plastic bottle or a football, so that they can hold on to it to stay afloat whilst help is on the way.

If they are too far away, WAIT FOR THE EMERGENCY SERVICES and reassure the casualty from the safety of the bank.
