We hope you are excited.








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Challenges:



French crêpes!

Crepes are a famous sugary dish from France. They are very thin pancakes that can be eaten with sugar, chocolate or strawberries with whipped cream, off course! Bon appétit!

Ingredients:

- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- 2 1/2 tbsp sugar
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/8 cup water
- 1/2 tsp vanilla
- tiny dash of salt



Instructions:

- 1. Whisk all the ingredients, except the flour, together. Add in the flour, a little bit at a time, whisking just until the flour has been mixed in.
- 2. Let the crepe batter rest for 10 minutes. Then, give the batter a quick whisk again before using.
- 3. Grease a non-stick, 6" skillet with unsalted butter and heat over medium heat. Pour about 2-3 tablespoons worth of batter into the pan and tip the pan from side to side to get the batter to spread out throughout the pan.
- 4. <u>WITH AN ADULT</u>, cook each side of the crepe for 30 seconds before gently loosening up the edges with a large spatula. If it lifts, then the crepe is ready to be flipped. If it doesn't lift up very well, give it 10 to 15 more seconds and try again. Gently lift the crepe out of the pan, then flip over into the pan and cook the other side for another 10 to 15 seconds; remove to cool.

The Spanish tortilla

Spanish is not only spoken in Spain but also in South America and in Mexico. We would like to share with you an easy tortilla recipe. You MUST do it with an adult.

Ingredients:



potatoes 2 medium, peeled and thinly sliced

olive oil

onion 1, sliced

chorizo 50g, chopped

eggs 4, beaten

parsley ½ a bunch, chopped

Instructions:

STEP 1

Heat a pan of boiling salted water and cook the potatoes until just tender. Drain well. Heat a tbsp of olive oil in a small non-stick frying pan and cook the onion until softened. Add the chorizo and cook for a few minutes then stir in the parsley.

STEP 2

Beat the eggs in a large bowl and season really well. Tip the potatoes, onion and chorizo into the bowl then mix and stir.

STEP 3

Wipe out the frying pan then add a tbsp more oil and heat again. Tip in the egg mix and leave over a medium heat until the bottom is browned and the top is set. Flip the tortilla onto a plate then slide the uncooked side down back into the pan. Cook for another 5 minutes until the bottom is set.
